Spelling Rule: Job titles often end in 'cian'

People can be identified by their jobs or an activity they are involved in. Their title often ends in the suffix "ian". When the title ends with "cian" the suffix makes a "shun" sound, not to be confused with "tion", which is never used for job titles.
