The Blue Mountains

The Blue Mountains are about 50 km west of Sydney.

When Europeans arrived in Australia, the Blue Mountains were inhabited by the

Gundungurra people.

The first officially recognised crossing of the mountains by Europeans is credited to Blaxland, Wentworth and Lawson in 1813.

Having been crossed, this opened up the vast grain growing and sheep grazing areas of New South Wales.

They are named the Blue Mountains because they look blue from Sydney. A fine mist of eucalyptus oil from gum leaves refracts light, which makes the haze look blue at a distance.

The Greater Blue Mountains Area is listed as a World Heritage Area.


